








Joint SLoCaT Partnership & AFCAP Work Program February – November 2015



Four Components:

- Advocacy on Rural Transport in finalization and implementation of SDGs
- Strengthen of the global Rural Transport Community through effective Dialogue
- Detail indicators on Rural Transport
- Contribute to SLoCaT's Financing Framework on Sustainable Transport

Global Processes on Sustainable Development Relevant to Rural Transport (1)

- Intergovernmental Negotiations on Post-2015 Development Agenda (New York):
 - Building on the 2012 United Nations Conference on Sustainable Development (Rio+20);
 - The Open Working Group (OWG) developing 17 draft SDGs in the period January 2013-July 2014;
 - Expected to culminate in adoption of SDG in special global summit in September 2015, in New York



Global Processes on Sustainable Development Relevant to Rural Transport (2)

- Third International Conference on Financing for Development (Addis Ababa – July 2015)
 - Builds on Monterey (2002) and Doha (2008) conferences for financing of development
 - Objective is to provide Finance Oriented
 Means of Implementation for the Post
 2015 Development Agenda
 - Zero Draft and First Draft outcome document available as basis for discussion



Draft SDGs (1-8)

- Goal 1 End poverty in all its forms everywhere
- Goal 2 End hunger, achieve food security and improved nutrition and promote sustainable agriculture
- Goal 3 Ensure healthy lives and promote well-being for all at all ages
- Goal 4 Ensure inclusive and equitable quality education and promote lifelong learning opportunities for all
- Goal 5 Achieve gender equality and empower all women and girls
- Goal 6 Ensure availability and sustainable management of water and sanitation for all
- Goal 7 Ensure access to affordable, reliable, sustainable and modern energy for all
- Goal 8 Promote sustained, inclusive and sustainable economic growth, full and productive employment and decent work for all

Draft SDGs (8-14)

- Goal 8 Promote sustained, inclusive and sustainable economic growth, full and productive employment and decent work for all
- Goal 9 Build resilient infrastructure, promote inclusive and sustainable industrialization and foster innovation
- Goal 10 Reduce inequality within and among countries
- Goal 11 Make cities and human settlements inclusive, safe, resilient and sustainable
- Goal 12 Ensure sustainable consumption and production patterns
- Goal 13 Take urgent action to combat climate change and its impacts
- Goal 14 Conserve and sustainably use the oceans, seas and marine resources for sustainable development

Draft SDGs (15-17)

- Goal 15 Protect, restore and promote sustainable use of terrestrial ecosystems, sustainably manage forests, combat desertification, and halt and reverse land degradation and halt biodiversity loss
- Goal 16 Promote peaceful and inclusive societies for sustainable development, provide access to
- justice for all and build effective, accountable and inclusive institutions at all levels
- Goal 17 Strengthen the means of implementation and revitalize the global partnership for sustainable development

Rural Transport and the (draft) SDGs

- No specific reference in the draft SDGs, but rural transport most relevant for:
 - SDG 2: End hunger, achieve food security and improved nutrition, and promote sustainable agriculture
 - SDG 9: Built resilient infrastructure, promote inclusive and sustainable industrialization and foster innovation
- In addition rural transport is also directly relevant for SDG 1 (end poverty); SDG 3 (health), SDG 4 (education), and SDG 5 (gender)
- Rural transport is acknowledged in draft indicator 9.2.2: Transport by air, road and rail (millions of passengers and ton- km and % population with access to all season road)
- Concern SLoCaT: not enough attention on Rural Transport Services

Rural Transport and the draft outcome document of the FfD Conference

- Linkage between Rural Transport Infrastructure and Services and End Hunger Campaign not well articulated (missed chance);
- Large emphasis on infrastructure development, but often general, not Transport specific and certainly not Rural Transport specific;
- Emphasis on hard infrastructure and for the case of transport not enough on transport services.
- Considerable emphasis on Private Sector Financing, which might not be that relevant for Rural Transport

What is needed next (1)?

- Too late to change SDGs and SDG targets
- Focus in stead on Indicators (especially in 2015 + 2016)
 - Develop more effective indicators for rural transport, i.e.
 Rural Access Indicator.
 - Ensure that transport services are incorporated in rural transport indicators
 - How to make rural transport indicators poverty and gender sensitive
 - Consider how to arrive at better data collection in support of RAI (e.g. big data, remote sensing)
 - Effective reporting mechanisms to report on national, regional and global progress on improving rural transport

What is needed next (2)?

- Possibly still scope for advocacy on FfD Outcome Document
- Three main points:
 - Linkage of Rural Transport and End Hunger/Rural Development;
 - Infrastructure focused language to be matched by language on (rural) transport services;
 - Private sector focus in infrastructure provision not fully suitable for rural development and rural transport

What is needed next (3)?

- Translation of Global Policy Consensus (SDGs + FfD) to National Level:
- Scope for AFCAP and Rural Transport Stakeholders:
 - Advocacy for development of appropriate institutional frameworks for rural transport infrastructure and services;
 - Strategic vision accompanied by programmatic approach and investment framework to development of rural transport, with appropriate indicators and reporting frameworks;
 - Rekindle the interest of the international development community in rural transport (UN, MDBs, Bi-laterals).
